







PICTURE - LETTER ASSOCIATION GAME






MATCHING GAME - LETTERS TO PICTURES

Play a matching game with the cards you have! Create a second set of cards with just letters on one side. Line up pictures on one side of you and letters on another side. Match the pictures with the letter that they start with.

MEMORY GAME - LETTERS TO PICTURES

Play a Memory game with the cards you have! Create a set of cards with just pictures and a set of cards with just letters. Create a 4x4 grid with 8 letter cards and 8 picture cards randomly placed face down. Take turns picking up two cards and revealing what they are. If the picture matches the letter that it matches, then you can leave them face up. If they do not, then place them face down again and the next person takes their turn. Create a larger grid for more of a challenge.

EXAMPLE:









CHANGE THE PUNCTUATION, CHANGE THE TONE!

When we use different punctuation, the way we say something changes. Exclamation marks mean we should sound more excited or say something louder! Question marks mean our voices should go up at the end? Periods sound normal. Replace the punctuation at the end of each phrase and practice saying the phrase correctly. Come up with your own phrases as well! Be silly and have fun!

EXAMPLE:

This is a dog.	This is a dog?	This is a dog!
