VISUALIZATION

Good readers construct mental images as they read a text. By using prior knowledge and background experiences, readers connect the author's writing with a personal picture. Through guided visualization, students learn how to create mental pictures as they read. As comprehension strategy, visualizing helps students understand the true size of new objects by comparing them to familiar objects.



WHY USE VISUALIZATION?

- Generating an image while reading requires that the reader be actively engaged with the text.
- Creating mental images while reading can improve comprehension.





WHILE READING

- Use details in the story to create mental images or "movies" during and after reading
- Understand that creating images helps in comprehending ideas
- Use images to draw conclusions and recall details
- Revise their images to add new information
- Understand that when you visualize, you are connecting prior knowledge to the words and text to make an inference about what something might look, smell, hear, feel, or taste like
